

The CANAPE Summer Newsletter

Summer has come to the land of CANAPE. Although not as hot and dry as last year, low water levels are still prevalent at several of our sites. If hot, dry summers are now indeed the new normal, this underlines the need to restore the hydrology of peatland to guard against wildfires.

As reported in the last newsletter, our new Charcoal burner has arrived in the Broads. Since its first arrival, it has produced over 1.5 tons of sustainable BBQ charcoal, from 4 different locations. This has now gone on sale for the first time, and been showcased at the Royal Norfolk Show, the UK's largest agricultural show.

Planning and preparation at Barver Moor in Germany has continued with the launch of the tenders for the construction works, now planned for this autumn. This site will be used to produce sphagnum, a potential replacement for peat based compost.

Back in the Broads, soil improver made from reed cut at the How Hill Nature Reserve was applied to Farmshare, a farming collective near Norwich. It is now being used to grow vegetables for the people of Norwich.



From waste reed to improved soil How to improve soil without using environmentally harmful peat based composts? Managing for their biodiversity benefits creates a large amount of waste biomass. Trials with Farmshare in Norfolk have begun to see if this can be a benefit to
