5 years, 8 pilot sites, a lot of excavators and several thousand plug plants later, the CANAPE project is coming to an end. The world is a very different place now than it was 5 years ago when the header picture of this email was taken (for those wondering, this group picture is the original CANAPE team in the Broads National Park).

The importance of natural systems and particularly of peatlands has been steadily climbing the agenda. The outputs and learning of the CANAPE project are therefore well placed to support the projects that are coming next, and the process of restoring peatlands across Europe and further afield.

In the next few months we are gathering these outputs to be made available on the project website <u>CANAPE - Creating A New Approach to Peatland</u> <u>Ecosystems</u> - which will continue to be online after the closure of the project.

Your Pocket Guide to Sustainable Peatland Farming

To support farmers & landowners to make use of the learning we have gathered from the CANAPE project, we have produced a Pocket Guide summarising the options for wetland farming. This is free to use and distribute.
